#### Suite for Violin and String Orchestra Op. 117

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As is well known, Sibelius put the finishing touches to his orchestral work *Tapiola* in 1926. During the same year he wrote incidental music for a production of Shakespeare's *The Tempest* at the Royal Theater in Copenhagen. He created a concert version of this during 1927–08. The period which follows these events is often referred to as "the silence of Järvenpää", during which not a single major symphonic work was ever published from his pen.

This is not to say that Sibelius was inactive. Erik Tawaststjerna makes it clear in his biography that Sibelius worked intensively on an eight symphony during the early 1930's, though the results were never exposed to public scrutiny. During the same period the composer also wrote a number of small-scale works and turned to reworking some of his early works.

In 1929 Sibelius sent some small pieces to the New York publisher Carl Fischer for consideration. Included among these was the Suite for Violin and String Orchestra, to which he had assigned the opus number 117. Fischer was obliged to refuse with this polite comment: "We must inform you that in view of the extremely unfortunate constellation in the music publishing field in the United States, it seems to us inadvisable at the present time to publish compositions of the high standard you have submitted to us. The market is very unfovorable for this class of music and we are compelled to return them to you with our regrets." Fischer's negative response with regard to the suite was evidently a blow to Sibelius's confidence. It is possible that this episode played its part in nurturing an undue level of self-critisicm in Sibelius, leading in turn to the demise of the eight symphony. A comment on the score of suite reads "Skizz. Omarbetas!" (Sketch. Still to be worked on.) Sibelius never returned to it, however, and he seems to have forgotten it thereafter.

The Suite for Violin and String Orchestra represents the culmination point in a series of works written for violin and orchestra which started with the serenades op. 69 and continued with the Six Humoresques opp. 87 & 89. Together these works bear witness to the composer's deep insight into the instrumental possibilities of the violin. In these works, more limited in formal scope than the Violin Concerto though they be, the voice of the solo violin – Sibelius' second mother-tongue – unites with the orchestral writing of a mature and experienced symphonist.

The reduction and solo part are published together for the first time.
