Kalevi Aho: Mysterium

Kvintetto pianolle vasemmalle kädelle ja jousikvartetille (2019)

Elokuussa 2017 pianisti Izumi Tateno kuuli suomalaisilla Oulunsalon musiikkijuhlilla teokseni *Sateen aikaan* (mezzosopraanolle ja jousikvartetille) kantaesityksen. Konsertin jälkeen Izumi tuli luokseni ja pyysi minulta kvintettoa pianolle vasemmalle kädelle ja jousikvartetille. Olin saanut aikaisemmin käsiini luonnokset Alexander Scriabinin keskeneräiseen viimeiseen sävellykseen *Mysterium*, ja Scriabinin fragmentaariset katkelmat innoittivat minua pianokvintettoon. Teos pohjautuu kauttaaltaan kuusiäänisiin skrjabinmaisiin harmonioihin, joiden pohjalta olen luonut myös teoksen melodiikan.

Noin 25 minuuttia kestävä *Mysterium* käsittää neljä yhtäjaksoisesti soitettavaa osaa. Ensimmäinen osa (Misterioso) on nimensä mukaisesti tunnelmaltaan hämyinen, mystinen. Voimakasilmeinen, nopea toinen osa (Vivace) etenee viisijakoissa 10/16- ja 15/16-rytmisissä. Kolmas osa (Adagio, misterioso) on taas hidaskuntoinen ja unelmoiva, kunnes päädytään 11/16-tahtilajissa alkavaan finaaliin (Moderato). Finaali kokoaa samalla kvinteton kaikkea musiikillista materiaalia yhteen, ja teos hiljenee lopulta mystisiin skrjabin-harmonioihin.

Mysterium on sävelletty talvella 2019. Teos on omistettu Izumi Tatenoille ja se kantaesitettiin 12.11.2019 Tokiossa.

Quintet for Piano Left Hand and String Quartet (2019)

In August 2017, Izumi Tateno the pianist heard the premiere of my *Rain Time* (for mezzo-soprano and string quartet) at the Finnish Oulunsalo Music Festival. After the concert, he came up to me and asked me to write a quintet for piano left hand and string quartet. I had earlier come across the sketches for what was to be the last, unfinished work, *Mysterium*, by Alexander Scriabin, and these fragmentary sketches inspired me to write this piano quintet. It is founded throughout on six-part Scriabin-like harmonies that also served as a basis for the melodic material.

Lasting about 25 minutes, *Mysterium* consists of four movements performed without a break. The first (Misterioso) is, as its name suggests, shadowy, mysterious in mood. The dynamic, quick second movement (Vivace) proceeds in quintuple 10/16 and 15/16 rhythms. The third movement (Adagio, misterioso) is again slow and dreamy, before arriving at the finale (Moderato) beginning in 11/16 time. The finale draws all the quintet's musical material together, and the work finally fades on mysterious Scriabin harmonies.

Mysterium was composed in winter 2019. It is dedicated to Izumi Tateno and the first performance took place in Tokyo 12th November 2019.
